


 Topic: How high can I jump?
 Week: 13th July 2020

Weekly Reading Tasks	Weekly Maths Tasks
<p>1) Share our story of the week 'Oliver's Vegetables' by Vivian French click here</p>  <p>2) Talk about the front cover together and ask the children what they think the story might be about. As they listen to the story, ask the children to make predictions about which vegetables Oliver might find in Grandad's garden, if they think he will like them and discuss any unfamiliar vocabulary. After reading, complete the activities at the back of the book and ask the children to tell you about their favourite part of the story, explaining what they liked and why.</p> <p>3) Use the 'Oliver's Vegetables Story Sequencing Cards' that are in the 'Resources and Activities to do at home' section of the class page click here. Can your child sequence and re-tell the story?</p> <p>Ongoing Weekly Reading Tasks Share a reading book from your bookshelf or choose a book from the Oxford Owl website: Oxford Owl Age 3-4 books</p>	<p>1) Our number of the week this week is the number 10! Watch Numberblocks Episode 'Ten' click here</p>  <p>2) Talk about the Numberblocks episode 'ten'. Can your child find examples of ten around your home? Can they show you ten with their fingers? Look at numerals up to ten, write the number ten as a numeral, make ten in different ways, count ten, bring me ten... etc. Is there anything we have ten of?</p> <p>3) Look at the 'Vegetable Counting Cards' that are in the 'Resources and Activities to do at home' section of the class page click here. Oliver has been helping his grandpa in the vegetable patch. Can your child count the number of vegetables that Oliver has found and point to the correct number?</p> <p>Ongoing Weekly Maths Tasks Sing a range of number songs to practise counting on and back and to practise the concept of one more and one less. You'll find some of our favourites here: Number Songs</p>
Weekly Phonic Tasks	Weekly Writing Tasks
<p>1) Introducing letter sounds 'm' and 'd': Find some objects around your home (or draw some pictures of objects) beginning with the 'm' or 'd' sound, e.g. mask, mouse, moon, man, mirror, drum, dog, door, duck, doll. Can your child sort the objects/pictures into a pile of things that begin with same sound? Show your child the letter that makes the 'm' and 'd' sound.</p> <p>2) Continue to try and blend some sounds together for your child to hear a word e.g. m-a-t spells mat, pad, man, nip, sad. You could show your child the letters as you say the sounds so they can see the written word too.</p> <p>Ongoing Weekly Phonics Tasks Sing Nursery Rhymes and songs together. Add in actions and change the words. Can children think of different rhyming words to add in? Repeat old favourites and learn new rhymes. Remember the BBC</p>	<p>1) Complete the Oliver's Vegetables pencil control sheets with your child. You will find them in our 'Resources and Activities to do at home' section of the class page click here. <i>If you don't have access to a printer, you could create your own.</i></p> <p>2) Practise forming the letters 'm' and 'd'. You could write them and your child could write over them. You could write them and your child could write them underneath. They could use a stick to practise writing them in the mud or you could put some shaving foam in a tray and they could practise writing them with their finger.</p> <p>Ongoing Weekly Writing Tasks Name writing – practise writing your child's name with them. Can they trace over or copy their name?</p>
